CERTIFICATE OF CANVASS OF GENERAL MUNICIPAL ELECTION.

Chief Deputy City Clerk gave the staff report. The City of Santa Maria consolidated its General Municipal Election held on November 4, 2008, with the Statewide General Election conducted by the County of Santa Barbara Elections Division. On December 2, 2008, County Clerk-Recorder Joseph Holland certified the election results including the election for Mayor, two members of the City Council, City Clerk, and City Treasurer. Based on the certified election results, Mayor Lavagnino was re-elected, Councilmember Bob Orach was re-elected for another term and Mike Cordero was elected as a new member of the City Council. Additionally, Patti Rodriguez was re-elected City Clerk and Teressa Hall was re-elected as City Treasurer. The County Clerk-Recorder's Certificate of Election Results of the Official Canvass must be accepted by the City Council. The newly elected officers will then be sworn in.

Chief Deputy City Clerk Perez administered the Oath of Office to City Clerk Rodriguez and presented a Certificate of Election to her.

City Clerk Rodriguez then administered the Oath of Office to Mayor Lavagnino and presented him with a Certificate of Election.

City Clerk Rodriguez administered the Oath of Office to Councilmembers Mike Cordero and Bob Orach and presented them with Certificates of Election.

City Treasurer Hall was not present and will be sworn in at a later date.

The newly elected officers were seated and given the opportunity to say a few words.

Mayor Lavagnino thanked the voters of the City of Santa Maria for their continued support. He thanked his wife, Donna, his daughter, Laurie, and son-in-law, Ed, his son, Steve and daughter-in-law, Marion. He thanked Patti Rodriguez for keeping his calendar straight. He welcomed Councilmember Mike Cordero to the City Council and congratulated him. He thanked Councilmember Leo Trujillo for his eight years of service and said Mr. Trujillo always did what he thought was best for the City. He thanked his colleagues on the City Council and City staff for their support. He said never did he believe he would have the great honor of being called the Mayor of the City of Santa Maria.

Councilmember Orach thanked the voters for having the confidence in him to elect him for another term. He congratulated Councilmember Mike Cordero. He thanked his wife, Mary Ellen. He thanked the employees of the City for making the Council look good by always doing their job. He thanked the bargaining units for supporting him.

Councilmember Cordero thanked God for the challenges he placed before him and for the strength and wisdom he has provided to successfully pursue those challenges. He thanked retired City employees Ken George and Ken Schnell for their assistance with his campaign. He thanked his family and friends who were at the meeting and those that could not be for their support. He thanked his three sons and daughter-in-laws for being here. He thanked the many groups and organizations that supported him in the

campaign including the three employee groups. He thanked Lila Reynolds, wife of former Police Chief Reynolds. He thanked his wife of 34 years for standing behind him all those years. He also thanked the community for the overwhelming support and for entrusting him with this responsibility. For those that voted for him, he would strive to keep their trust and confidence; and for those that did not, he would strive to earn their trust, respect and confidence. He said he couldn't describe how special it felt to be sitting in the seat that so many great local leaders of the City have sat in.

At 6:45 p.m. Mayor Lavagnino called a short recess for a reception to recognize and meet the newly elected officers.

Mayor Lavagnino reconvened the City Council meeting at 7:05 p.m. with all members again present and continued with the regular agenda.

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Director Posada thanked the judges and sponsors and congratulated all those who received Awards of Excellence.

PUBLIC COMMENT

Mayor Lavagnino announced that he would be pulling Consent Agenda Item 3E, Ordinance No. 2008-29 establishing an HC zone, and would allow people to comment on that item at that time.

Mary Jacka congratulated Councilmember Mike Cordero on joining the Council team. She said there were many needs in the community that were getting worse. For the new year the whole community needed to look at ways to assist the less fortunate members of the community.

Paula James congratulated Councilmember Mike Cordero, Councilmember Orach, and Mayor Lavagnino. She wished the Council a Merry Christmas and congratulated Police Chief Macagni for a job well done.

Vibriana Saavedra thanked Councilmember Zacarías and Patino for standing up for the downtown businesses at the last meeting and voting against the HC zoning ordinance.

Deborah Brasket, SBCAN, also congratulated the newly elected officers and welcomed Councilmember Mike Cordero. She said they were going to miss Kirk Lindsey as they enjoyed working with him.

CONSENT CALENDAR

Mayor Lavagnino pulled Item 3E – Ordinance No. 2008-29 creating an HC Zoning District. He said after the last meeting he was concerned about this ordinance and had asked City Manager Ness to prepare a matrix on the allowable uses in the FS zone and the proposed HC zone.

Councilmember Zacarias asked for a point of order on reconsidering this item.

City Attorney Trujillo stated there were a number of ways to accomplish this. Because this was a second reading of the ordinance, a majority of the Council could choose to alter the ordinance. If that was the case, he would recommend the ordinance be re-introduced for first reading with the changes and brought back for second reading and adoption at the next meeting.

Joann Marmolejo, Santa Maria Community Coalition, asked the Council to consider encouraging developers to build in the downtown area and discourage future development that was in conflict with the Downtown Specific Plan.

Gordon Gill, representing General Development Company, congratulated the newly elected officers. He said their property was located at the corner of Betteravia and Highway 101 and was currently in the FS zone with very limited uses. That was why their property had not developed. He asked the Council to remember there were only 12 undeveloped acres that would be affected by this ordinance. These properties were prime acres and entrances into the City.

Jay Hartman stated his family has had an underlying lease on the property at Highway 101 and Betteravia for over 40 years. They had not been able to lease the property because of the restrictive zoning. All around it on all sides was C-2 zoning. With the FS zoning restrictions, the property would not develop. The proposed HC zoning would still require a zone change for each property that could be looked at on a case-by-case basis.

Todd Hartman stated their property was 4.68 acres. They owned 1.66 percent of the property at the intersection of Highway 101 and Betteravia and were surrounded by C-2 zoning. Their property was very insignificant in size but very important as an entrance into the City. It was very frustrating to them that they could not get any tenants for their property. This ordinance would not approve anything. They would still have to come back and apply for a zone change.

Lynda Hartman stated that while a vibrant and well planned downtown was important, their property was a gateway into the City. Highway 101 had a traffic count of three million cars a month. The traffic count along their portion of Betteravia was close to 40,000 per day. City government should place equal importance on the gateways into the City as well as the downtown area.

James Murr, Santa Maria Community Coalition, expressed opposition to the HC zoning district because it would undermine the Downtown Specific Plan. He referenced stores that were closing and problems getting tenants at the Santa Maria Town Center. He talked about the commercial development already approved outside the downtown. He suggested the City Council listen to what the residents wanted for the City, not what developers wanted.

George Dailey requested the Council abandon the HC zoning district. He said any further commercialization of the Highway 101 corridor would be a detriment to the Downtown Specific Plan.

Deborah Brasket, SBCAN, stated they opposed the HC zoning ordinance because it would be in direct competition to the downtown center. In these harsh economic times, the emphasis should be placed in the downtown area. There were too many vacant stores in the downtown. The City needed to be more creative in what went in along the freeway.

Toru Miyoshi stated the issue was a matter of supply and demand. He supported the small businesses who were having a difficult time. Any new businesses that trapped traffic on the freeway would hurt the downtown businesses. The City was trying to restore its downtown viability and anything that took businesses away from the downtown would be counterproductive.

Laurie Tamura, Urban Planning Concepts, representing the Tompkins, stated she felt responsible for bringing this forward. Mr. Tompkins owned a very small piece of property on East Main Street and the freeway. Staff came up with a proposal that bridged the gap between Freeway Service and General Commercial. The adoption of the HC zone would not affect the downtown. It was only a tool in the City's tool box. Each one of the properties would have to come to the Planning Commission and City Council for a zone change.

Nick Tompkins said he understood the concerns about making sure the downtown was vibrant. The Freeway Service zoning was very restrictive. He had four lease spaces and had only been able to lease two of the spaces. There were a lot of people who lived on the east side of the City, but there was not a lot available for them. He asked the Council to look at what was adjacent to these properties.

City Manager Ness highlighted the options available to the Council: 1) make no change to the ordinance that was introduced at the last meeting; 2) reduce the number of uses; 3) abandon the HC zone and encourage Mr. Hartman and Mr. Tompkins to apply for a rezoning; 4) abandon the HC zone with no further action. He distributed a decision matrix showing the proposed permitted uses and conditional uses and indicating those uses currently allowed under the FS zoning.

Proposed Permitted Uses

Mayor Lavagnino supported excluding sporting goods, home improvement centers and furniture sales from the HC zone as a permitted use.

City Manager Ness pointed out that staff was now recommending that grocery stores be allowed to remain but reduced in size to 5,000 feet. Staff was suggesting convenience stores, pharmacies, banks and financial institutions, and physical fitness/health clubs be allowed to remain as permitted uses. Cell phone sales and repair, florists, and hair or nail salons were suggested to be added to the list of permitted uses.

Councilmember Zacarías stated before receiving the matrix she had identified the uses she supported which were only the ones currently allowed. She would support the convenience store and cell phone sales and repair being added. Under the proposed conditional uses she would not support adding anything and only allow the ones currently allowed in the FS zone.

Councilmember Patino thanked the Mayor for allowing this to be reconsidered. She said it was important to keep the small businesses in the community. The Council owes the young people the opportunity to become small business owners. The convenience store and cell phone sales would be good along the freeway. There was a need for a grocery store downtown. Home improvement, furniture sales, and physical fitness could require more space than would be available downtown and would be okay along the freeway. Pharmacies, banks and financial institutions, florists, and hair and nail salons should be deleted.

Councilmember Orach stated some retail vehicle fuel dispensing stations had a carwash component and a convenience store. That should be taken into account. He said a home improvement center would take up too much space for the downtown area. Sporting goods, grocery stores, pharmacies, physical fitness centers, cell phone sales, and hair salons should be deleted. Convenience stores were okay.

Councilmember Cordero stated although he was not on the Council at the last meeting, he attended the last meeting, looked at the video and read the minutes. He was a little troubled also after that meeting. He said he could support the three uses that were currently allowed; however, sporting goods, home improvement centers, furniture sales, grocery stores, pharmacies, banks, fitness center, florists, and hair salons would compete with the downtown. Convenience stores and cell phone sales and repair could remain.

Mayor Lavagnino agreed with the three current uses but could not support sporting goods, grocery stores, or physical fitness centers.

The consensus of the City Council for permitted uses in the H-C Zone was:

- A - Retail Vehicle Fuel Dispensing Stations
- B - Hotels and Motels

- C - Restaurants including Cafes and Specialty Eating Establishments
- E - Home Improvement Centers including outdoor spa/patio furniture
- F - Furniture Sales including outdoor spa/patio furniture
- H - Convenience stores
- L - Cell phone sales and repair

Conditional Uses

Director of Community Development Lindsey advised the Council that car-related uses such as vehicle repair and sales were not permitted in the downtown so they would not compete with the downtown.

Mayor Lavagnino read the list of conditional uses which were currently allowed under the FS zone including a) beer and wine with meal, b) bar or cocktail lounge if it is an accessory use to a motel, hotel, restaurant or café, c) auto service or repair service, repair and parking of vehicles to be screened from view, and d) drive-in or drive-thru establishments if associated with any permitted or conditionally permitted use in the H-C zone.

Councilmember Zacarías asked how many parcels in the 12 acres would be large enough for car sales.

Director Lindsey stated some of the parcels could only handle 15 to 20 vehicles for a car lot. It would be a very small dealership. Two other sites that were about four acres each could handle a larger auto sales.

Councilmember Zacarías stated she would like bowling alley to be removed but could support the others.

Councilmembers Orach, Patino, and Cordero agreed with removing bowling alley.

Council consensus for the conditional uses in the H-C zone was:

- A - Beer and wine with meals
- B - Bar or Cocktail lounge if accessory to motel, hotel, restaurant or café
- C - Auto service or repair service
- D - Drive-in or drive-thru establishments if associated with any permitted or conditionally permitted use in the H-C zone
- E - Carwash
- F - Recreational vehicle sales or rentals including RV's, trailers, boats, motorcycles, all terrain vehicles
- G - Auto vehicle sales including service when associated with auto vehicle sales
- H - Auto rental
- I - RV park for active use (no storage)

Consent Calendar Item 3-E, Ordinance No. 2008-29 establishing the H-C zoning district, was re-introduced as amended by title only for first reading and continued to the

next meeting for second reading and adoption, on motion by Councilmember Cordero, seconded by Zacarías and carried on the following vote:
