**GEM AWARD**

City Manager Ness presented the quarterly "Going the Extra Mile (GEM)" Award to Rod Rodriguez, Cynthia Torres, Karl Kovarik and Bill Cyr, the Water Resources Division Customer Service Team, for providing customers with a quality blend of leadership, technical proficiency, and empathy during these challenging times in spite of a significantly increased workload created by the recession.

**VOLUNTEER OF THE MONTH**

Councilmember Zacarías presented a gift to the Recreation and Parks Volunteer of the Month for May 2009, Terry Rianda, for his dedication and commitment in recruiting younger athletes for the Northern Santa Barbara County Special Olympics Juniors' Program and for volunteering at local competitions and fundraising events for Special Olympics.

**PROCLAMATION – UNDERAGE DRINKING PREVENTION MONTH**

Councilmember Patino read a proclamation declaring the month of May 2009, as "Underage Drinking Prevention Month" in the City of Santa Maria and calling upon all residents, parents, youth, government agencies, public and private institutions, businesses and workplaces, hospitals and schools in Santa Maria Valley to support

efforts by Fighting Back Santa Maria Valley Coalition for the prevention of drug and alcohol abuse that will reduce and prevent underage drinking in our community. The proclamation was accepted by Dawnette Smith and a group of teenagers from Fighting Back Santa Maria Valley.

### **PUBLIC COMMENT**

Belen Seara spoke on behalf of a large Hispanic contingency in the community. The Santa Maria Police Department regulates checkpoints based on the California Vehicle Code Section 14602.6 which refers to the impoundment for 30 days of cars driven by unlicensed drivers. Since the overwhelming majority of unlicensed drivers are undocumented immigrants who are ineligible to receive licenses, the policy unfairly targets these immigrants. Other cities have adopted different codes to reduce the number of confiscations. These unlicensed drivers do not endanger the residents of Santa Maria. Santa Maria was one of only two cities in California that goes after unlicensed drivers. The Ninth Circuit Appellate Court ruled that impounding a car simply because the driver lacks a license violated the Fourth Amendment prohibition of unwarranted searches and seizures. A car is to be towed only if it constituted a safety hazard. The California Supreme Court authorized sobriety checkpoints subject to the strict Ingersoll Guidelines. Although the Santa Maria Police Department cites drunk driving to justify checkpoints, the facts show that the guidelines are ignored and checkpoints are operated to maximize the impoundments of cars driven by undocumented immigrants. She read some of the guidelines. The Police Department has not kept files on the DUI checkpoints. Every driver should be stopped at the checkpoints to avoid racial profiling. Personnel should be instructed to not stop drivers that try to avoid the check point. Signs announcing the checkpoint should be placed sufficiently in advance of the checkpoint so motorists can choose to avoid the checkpoint. People trying to avoid the checkpoints were chased by the police officers. The checkpoints start between 3:00 p.m. and 5:00 p.m., right when people are getting off work. The Police Department provided 24-hour advance publicity to all the local media. However, PUEBLO recommended that affected businesses, neighbors, and organizations also be given advance warning of checkpoints.

Roy Allen, Alzheimer's Association, thanked the City Council for their generosity and for giving them a little bit more money this year.

Victoria Huber, Future Leaders of America, thanked Councilmembers Zacarías and Cordero for supporting their Tobacco-Free Parks campaign. She presented them with Certificates of Appreciation.

Mickey Freeman stated the City recently adopted an ordinance banning flower vendors and asked if there would be an ordinance banning illegal food carts and people selling food out of their cars. She said people needed to obey the laws. She thanked the Police Department.

Gwen Wood talked about PUEBLO's comments at the last meeting regarding the vehicle checkpoints. She said PUEBLO wanted preferential treatment; and if that was

not racial profiling, she did not know what was. The City Council could not change State law. If PUEBLO felt the law was unfair, they should go to the Governor to get the law changed.

Arnoldo Vela said he came to Santa Maria because it was a beautiful City; but lately it had become a divided City. The DUI checkpoints were affecting the business community tremendously. He asked the Council to find a middle ground to enforce the laws and help the businesses survive in Santa Maria.

Mark Rademaker spoke about the people's right to bear arms. He said Police Officers were five times more dangerous than people with guns. To save money, the City should close down the Police Department and give all the residents guns to protect themselves.

Richard Dydell spoke about the H2A Ag Workers Program. He said the Federal Government was rewriting sections of the H2A program; and when it was complete, he would present it to the Council. Many cities had these traffic stops. As a 48-year resident of Santa Maria, he did not see any racial profiling going on. People had to have a license to drive. He said he was one of the silent majority who were highly in favor of the traffic stops.

Paula James read a statement from Sally Rodriguez who did not speak very good English. Her statement said she was a legal Hispanic immigrant who supported the Police Chief in the enforcement of the law and the checkpoint stops to help uncover all illegal traffic violators regardless of who they were.

Mary Jacka stated she was in favor of the Emergency Operations Center, Item 3I on the Consent Agenda. It was a big need for the City. She read a letter from Pastor Vaughn Winters of St. John Neumann Church. The letter indicated he was being transferred to Palmdale effective July 1, 2009, and wanted to write about people having their cars impounded for lack of a driver's license at sobriety checkpoints because it largely impacted the poorest of the community and created a severe hardship for them. Taking away their cars did not do any good for the City and created more strain on social service agencies and churches, and engendered a lack of trust and ill will. Their lack of a driver's license was only one small piece of the vast issue of undocumented immigrants in this country and was beyond the scope of the City to solve. The impound policy at sobriety checkpoints was unjust and harmed the social fabric of the City.

Paula James stated PUEBLO seemed to want some of the laws to be enforced and some not. Illegal immigration was a crime. It was a felony for anyone to transport, shelter, or assist an illegal alien in gaining employment or living in this country. She suggested that PUEBLO tell the illegal aliens that it was not their right to drive without licenses. The main reason this had become such a tremendous issue for Americans was because the illegal aliens harmed Americans every single day. She said she would not stop fighting this fight.

Brett Honig stated the Police Department needed to change their actions in this town. He said he had requested a meeting with the Mayor but had gotten no response. The Police Department was not going on calls on time. They were wasting the taxpayers' money. The buses were wasting taxpayers' money by running on Sunday when they had no one riding them. The buses were dirty. Cigarette butts needed to be cleaned up all over the City.

Ernest Armenta stated if the City was going to support legislation, there should be a Legislative Committee so the Council received input from the public. He talked about there being no representatives in the City for the Chicanos. PUEBLO and MAPA did not represent them. He said when he saw checkpoints, he avoided them. Not because he didn't have a license or insurance, but because he didn't have time. He talked about the City's cash flow problem. He asked what plans the City had in place if the State propositions failed.

David Basket stated he appreciated the Police Department's efforts to keep the City safe from unlicensed drivers. In any other country, if you drove without a driver's license and insurance, you would be serving jail time.

### **CONSENT CALENDAR**

Mayor Lavagnino requested Item 3C – Severe Fiscal Hardship, be pulled for comment.

Mayor Lavagnino stated this item was a resolution finding that a severe fiscal hardship would result for the City if the State of California followed through on its threat to take \$2 billion from local governments to help balance the State budget in 2009-10. The Governor claimed that if the propositions did not pass, the State budget would have a \$21 billion deficit. The Governor said he would have to take about \$2 billion from local government. That would mean more than \$1.5 million from the City of Santa Maria. The City already had a \$5.6 million revenue gap for next fiscal year resulting from the economic downturn. It was not fair that the State could come to cities and counties and take funds that these agencies had put away for a rainy day. The City would try to close the gap with a combination of cuts, concessions and one-time reserves. If the State took another \$1.5 million, it would assuredly lead to employee layoffs. The residents of the City would suffer because of the inability of the State to balance its own budget.

Councilmember Patino asked how the State could just take money from cities and counties and why the City would have to just write the Governor a check.

City Manager Ness explained that under Proposition 1A which was passed by the voters in 2004, the State could borrow money from cities and counties during an extreme financial emergency. They would have to pay it back in three years. The State would just keep sales tax monies, property tax revenue, and vehicle license fees that were owed to the City.

Councilmember Zacarías announced that she would be attending a budget briefing in Sacramento put on by the Childcare Associations of California regarding the impacts on childcare services and support for families to be able to work.

Resolution No. 2009-65 was adopted finding a severe fiscal hardship will exist for the City of Santa Maria if the State of California takes additional City property tax funds and additional unfunded mandates are adopted by the State to balance the State budget.

**APPROVAL OF FISCAL YEAR 2009-10 FINAL ALLOCATIONS & ACTIVITIES UNDER THE COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT (CDBG) AND HOME INVESTMENT PARTNERSHIPS PROGRAMS.**

Community Programs Manager Coelho-Hudson gave the staff report. The City Council will consider adoption of resolutions approving the final allocations and activities for use of Federal funds under the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program and the HOME Investment Partnerships Program for Fiscal Year 2009-10. The public hearing for this item was conducted on April 7, 2009, closed to further public testimony, and continued to the City Council meeting of May 5, 2009. At that meeting, the item was again continued to May 19, 2009, as final allocations had not yet been issued by HUD. On May 1, 2009, HUD issued the final grant amounts for both the CDBG and HOME programs. Under the CDBG program, the City will receive \$1,272,132 which is \$15,644 more than estimated. Of that amount, \$254,426 (20 percent) will be available for General Administration, \$190,819 (15 percent) will be available for Public Services, and \$826,887 will be available for Capital Projects. Under the HOME Program, the City will receive \$408,145 which is \$43,458 more than anticipated. On May 11, 2009, the Block Grants Advisory Committee reconsidered their recommendation and developed a revised recommendation. Concerning CDBG Public Services, the Advisory Committee directed staff to increase the allocation amounts by prorating the percentage of increase of 1.266% or \$2,387 and increasing each of the recommended allocations by that amount. Because Good Samaritan Shelter was recommended for the total amount requested, their 1.266% increase or \$253 was divided among the other agencies. Under the CDBG Capital funding, since all three applications were already recommended for full funding, the additional \$10,169 was added to the City of Santa Maria Capital Project allocation, increasing the allocation to \$364,511. The additional \$43,458 in HOME funds was added to Good Samaritan Shelter's Casa de Familia Project as that was the only project recommended for funding. Staff submitted the Annual Action Plan to HUD based on the estimated grant amounts prior to the statutory deadline of May 15, 2009, with the understanding that the plan would be revised at a later time to reflect the final grant amounts.

Councilmember Zacarias stated she understood the Committee wanted to be fair and asked if consideration had been given to those organizations that had not been funded at the same level as last year.

Community Programs Manager Coelho-Hudson stated the consensus of the Committee was to prorate the increase across the board to be fair to all agencies.

Mayor Lavagnino thanked the Block Grants Advisory Committee for their hard work.

Mayor Lavagnino stated public safety was the most important thing the Council could give to the City of Santa Maria. He proposed that Fire Station No. 3 be replaced with a new Fire Station on Preisker Lane. This was in consultation with City Manager Ness and Fire Chief Ortiz. There was a balance of \$364,511 from CDBG Capital Development funds, \$341,281 in 2009-10 CDBG-R funds from the Stimulus Package, \$282,820 from 2008-09 reallocated CDBG Capital Development Project funds, \$450,000 in Growth Mitigation Funds designated for the Northwest Fire Station, and \$1.5 million reallocated General Fund monies from the Police Department Impound Yard, giving close to \$3 million which was the cost to build the new Fire Station. That would build a Fire Station to protect the northwest part of town and only use a small amount of General Fund revenue.

Councilmember Zacarías asked that the matter be placed on the June 2nd meeting to provide the Council and the public with more information.

City Manager Ness suggested it be brought back as part of the mid-cycle budget review on June 16th as a Council policy issue.

Councilmember Orach stated a lot of communities use the Community Development Block Grant funds for City capital projects and do not fund public service organizations at all.

Councilmember Cordero stated this was not a new proposal and had been in the works for quite a while.

#### **QUARTERLY FINANCIAL REPORT**

Director of Administrative Service Snodgrass gave the staff report. With 75 percent of the year complete, revenues are at 60.1 percent of projections while expenditures are at 70.4 percent of appropriations. Total revenue and transfers are \$33.4 million less than 75 percent and are approximately \$945,500 less than the prior year. Though a substantial number of revenues received in July and August will be accrued back to June, total year-end revenues are not expected to equal the budget primarily because of the decline in sales and property taxes during the first three quarters. However, the Citywide cost containment measures implemented in January are significantly reducing current costs and should result in revenues slightly exceeding expenses at year-end. Current projections indicate that the General Fund will have \$860,217 in excess revenues that may be used for next year's shortfall. In the Water/Wastewater Fund, expenditures exceeded revenues by \$11.1 million, primarily as a result of payments for State Water and capital projects. In the Solid Waste Fund, refuse expenses exceeded revenues by \$2.1 million as a result of capital outlay/projects. While the financial challenges facing the City are of historic proportion, the financial challenges do not include potential raids on municipal revenues by the State of California. On a bright

note, the Federal stimulus money is expected to provide more than \$20 million for countywide transportation projects and \$40 million for the Santa Maria River Levee repair.

Ernest Armenta stated the Recreation and Parks employees, the Utilities employees, and public safety employees needed to think of pay cuts or pink slips. Pay increases needed to be off the table completely. The people on the north side were totally opposed to a new Fire Station there.

City Manager Ness stated last year when the budget was adopted, the City planned to build two Fire Stations on the north side; but the City does not have the money right now to build two and staff an additional one.

Council received and filed the Quarterly Financial Report.

### **MEASURE D ONE-YEAR LOCAL PROGRAM OF PROJECTS**

Director of Public Works/City Engineer Whitehead gave the staff report. In November 1989, the voters approved the Santa Barbara Improvement Program Ordinance and Expenditure Plan known as Measure D. Measure D will expire in 2010. In compliance with the ordinance, each year the City of Santa Maria holds a public hearing, adopts a Local Program of Projects for Measure D expenditures, and submits it to the Santa Barbara County Association of Governments (SBCAG). In the past, public hearings have been held at the City Council meetings. This year, the public hearing was held at an evening workshop on April 27, 2009, to solicit public input. No one from the community attended the workshop. Staff prepared the Local Program of Projects to cover the remaining year of the program. The list of proposed projects complies with the requirements of the Measure D ordinance.

It is important to note that a portion of Santa Maria's local Measure D funding is dedicated to regional paratransit. These transit funds are estimated at \$43,612 in the FY 09/10 period and are not shown on the Local Program of Projects because the funds are administered directly by SBCAG. The monies provide assistance to the frail and elderly to use transit in Santa Maria.

Councilmember Zacarías asked if the \$500,000 in reserves had been included in other Program of Projects.

Director Whitehead explained that staff anticipated that there would be a period of time between the end of sales tax generation under Measure D and the sales tax generation under Measure A where the City might not receive any disbursements from SBCAG. Staff wanted to put some funds into a reserve account just in case. SBCAG might be able to do something to make that unnecessary.

Councilmember Zacarías asked if it would be used as a cash flow for the maintenance projects that needed to happen before the City began receiving Measure A funds. She asked if there were projects that were not done in order to create the reserve.

Director Whitehead explained there was always more work that could be done. Staff showed funding levels that were not as high as they would like them to be. That reserve money would be spent on street maintenance. It was just a question of when it would happen.

Councilmember Zacarías asked if there was any provision that the reserve would only be for one year or any practice for managing the funds.

City Manager Ness stated the reserve funds would be spent. They were earmarked specifically for street maintenance and could not be used for any other purpose. Once the determination was made by SBCAG regarding the interruption of cash flow from the sales tax, staff would be in a position to decide where the money needed to be spent. It would be spent on the items that appear in the Program of Projects.

Director Whitehead stated the Program of Projects was not a budget document. The reserve funds were included to be more transparent and provide a complete level of detail.

Councilmember Zacarías stated she appreciated that this was the best use of the funds to ensure there was no lapse in service. She said there were two issues that she recalled being brought up under public comment. One was the lack of street lighting in certain neighborhoods. She asked what the City was doing to determine if there were certain areas that needed additional street lights. The second was pedestrian crossing enhancements. The City recognized the issue of hit-and-run drivers and its low ranking in the State. She felt the City was not doing anything to decrease pedestrian fatalities and was excited to see pedestrian crossing enhancements in the Program of Projects.

Resolution No. 2009-73 was adopted approving the Measure D One-Year Local Program of Projects on motion by Councilmember Orach, seconded by Councilmember Patino, and carried on the following vote:
