PUBLIC COMMENT

Bob Ziener spoke about Columbus Day on October 12th and the flag ship Santa Maria. He talked about the need to construct a life size replica of the Santa Maria for the downtown area to establish a City identity.

Isaac Berumen, Latino Community Business Council, talked about the successful Fiesta Patrias event on September 11th and thanked the City for its help with the event.

Richard Dydell spoke about the need for a County ordinance for the H2A Ag Workers Program. He said his group was gathering signatures on petitions, and he would be requesting a City Council resolution in the future supporting that type of ordinance.

Richard Dydell introduced Sally Rodriguez and read a letter from her supporting more police traffic stops, especially at night. She was almost the victim of a serious accident by a drunk driver.

Ernest Armenta talked about the proposed ballot measure to increase salary and benefits for the Santa Maria Police Officers Association. He also talked about the POA supporting the Mayor and several Councilmembers in the last election. He said if the Police Officers were not satisfied with the pay they were getting, there were others in the Police Academy willing to take their jobs.

Kelly Van Allen, a teacher at Pine Grove Elementary, introduced Tiana Evans, a student in her class. Miss Evans stated she and another classmate raised over \$41.00 for graffiti abatement and gave it to the Recreation and Parks Department of the City of Santa Maria.

Sister Janet Corcoran thanked the Council for its on-going support of Peace Week and thanked the People for Nonviolence Committee for their work in planning the Peace Week events. She said Peace Week reminds everyone that peace begins with each person.

A. ORDINANCES

The reading in full of all ordinances and resolutions was waived. Ordinances on the Consent Calendar were adopted by the same vote cast at the first reading unless City Council indicated otherwise.

B. MINUTES

The Minutes of the Regular City Council Meeting of September 15, 2009, were approved as submitted.

C. RELEASE OF BOND

The City Council accepted as complete the public improvements associated with Rose Garden Village, Tract 5725, Unit 2, and authorized the release of a Faithful Performance Bond in the reduced amount of \$50,000 for the construction and installation of public improvements, with the order that the Contractor, Labor and Material Bond be retained until April 2010 and the Guarantee and Defective Material Bond be retained until October 2010.

D. RELEASE OF BOND

The City Council accepted as complete the public improvements associated with Bradley Square, Tract 5782, Phases 4, 6 and 7, and authorized the release of a Faithful Performance Bond in the reduced amount of \$38,650 for the construction and installation of public landscaping and irrigation improvements including one-year maintenance.

E. RELEASE OF BONDS

The City Council accepted as complete the public improvements associated with West A Street Business Center, Tract 5879, Unit 2, and authorized the release of a Faithful Performance Bond in the reduced amount of \$50,000 for the construction and installation of site utilities and traffic signal improvements, and a Faithful Performance Bond in the amount of \$22,207 for the construction and installation of public improvements for Betteravia Road, with the order that the Contractor, Labor and Material Bonds be retained until April 2010 and the Guarantee and Defective Material Bonds be retained until October 2010.

Second reading by title only of Ordinance No. 2009-22 was conducted adding Section 8-10.22.1, Meter Credits, and amending Section 8-10.05.01, State Water Reimbursement Fee, to implement a new 3/4" x 3/4" water meter size and the Ordinance was adopted.

GENERAL PLAN AMENDMENT AND ZONE CHANGE FOR THE CITY OF SANTA MARIA FIRE STATION #5 LOCATED AT THE SOUTHEAST CORNER OF PREISKER PARK, 330 HIDDEN PINES WAY.

Director of Community Development Appel gave the staff report. The City Council is asked to consider a recommendation from the Planning Commission for review of a Negative Declaration of Environmental Impact, an amendment to the General Plan (Land Use) from ROS (Recreational Open Space) to CF (Community Facilities), and a zone change from OS (Open Space) to PF (Public Facilities). The project includes a Project Review Permit to allow the construction of a 6,688 square foot fire station on an approximately 1.2 acre portion of a 38.9 acre park site, located at the southeast corner of Preisker Park, 330 Hidden Pines Way, a portion of Assessor's Parcel No. 117-030-076. Fire Station #5 is the second of two new fire stations to be located in the northern area of the City. The new Fire Station #5 is part of the City Fire Department's Strategic Plan. This Fire Station would serve the northwest quadrant of the City. The second new Fire Station to be located on East Donovan Road would serve the northeast quadrant of the City. It was originally named Station #5 as that was the next sequential number for fire stations; however, it would really be #3 since the current Station #3 was moving to the new station. When all the permitting was completed, it would be changed to Fire Station #3.

At its regularly scheduled meeting on September 16, 2009, the Planning Commission adopted two resolutions recommending, on a 5-0 vote, that the City Council approve the Negative Declaration and approve the General Plan Amendment and Zone Change.

Mayor Lavagnino opened the Public Hearing. Hearing no requests to speak, Mayor Lavagnino closed the Public Hearing.

Ordinance No. 2009-23 introduced. AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SANTA MARIA, CALIFORNIA, REZONING PROPERTY FOR THE SANTA MARIA FIRE STATION #5 PROJECT, GPZ-2009-001, ON A PORTION OF ASSESSOR'S PARCEL NO. 117-030-076, LOCATED IN THE SOUTHEAST CORNER OF PREISKER PARK, 330 HIDDEN PINES WAY.

Councilmembers expressed excitement and joy at being able to build two new fire stations for the City.

City Manager Ness stated there were 8,000 applications submitted nationwide for this stimulus funding. Only 95 agencies received grants, and Santa Maria was the third highest funding in the nation and the most in California. The City received \$4.3 million for two fire stations.

PROPOSITION 1A SECURITIZATION PROGRAM.

Director of Administrative Services Snodgrass gave the staff report. The City Council is asked to consider a request to approve the sale of the Proposition 1A receivable due from the State of California and approve the execution of a Purchase and Sale Agreement with California Statewide Communities Development Authority. Proposition 1A was passed by California voters in 2004 to ensure that local property tax and sales tax revenues remain with local governments. The passage of Proposition 1A effectively safeguards funding for public safety, health, libraries, parks and other local services. The Proposition does contain provisions to suspend Proposition 1A if the Governor declares a fiscal necessity and two-thirds of the Legislature concurs with the suspension. The emergency suspension of Proposition 1A occurred as a part of the Governor's efforts to solve the State of California budget deficit. The Governor signed legislation authorizing the State to borrow 8 percent of property tax due to cities, counties, and special districts, totaling \$1.935 billion. The State is required to repay these obligations plus interest within three years, or by June 30, 2013. The receivable resulting from this action is a legal debt that may be sold in the debt market. To assist local governments, the California Communities established a Proposition 1A securitization program to sell the Proposition 1A receivable on the bond market. Securitizing means that local governments can sell the Proposition 1A Receivable to California Communities, which will then sell the combined receivable on the bond market. Local governments must decide to either wait until 2013 for repayment, while earning three years of interest income, or securitize the debt and receive the full receivable amount in 09-10.

Local governments that wish to participate in the Proposition 1A Securitization must submit the required documents to California Communities by November 6, 2009. However, the California State Legislature did not pass clean up legislation, entitled SB67, before the Legislature adjourned in September. This legislation authorizes local agencies to sell the Proposition 1A receivable to a joint powers authority for an upfront payment of 100 percent of the lost property tax. It is expected that the Legislature will reconvene by mid-October and SB67 will be approved. Should the Legislature fail to pass SB67 and the bonds cannot be sold by December 31, 2009, all documents submitted to California Communities will be destroyed, the securitization process will stop, and local governments will wait until June 2013 to collect the amounts borrowed by the State, plus interest of two percent.

This year the City of Santa Maria will "loan" the State of California \$1.5 million of property tax revenues. This \$1.5 million reduction in revenues is in addition to the \$2.9 million decrease in the City's sales tax revenues caused by the downturn in the economy. During

the "2009-10 Mid-Cycle Budget Review," Santa Maria General Fund departments reduced operating appropriations by five percent to offset the expected reduction in revenues. Severe General Fund budget reductions occurred this year, so a loss of another \$1.5 million loaned to the State will likely cause a reduction in General Fund services and programs.

Councilmember Patino expressed concern about the State honoring the requirement to pay all costs associated with the sale of the bonds.

Mayor Lavagnino stated his concern with waiting the three years for the State to pay back the money was that the State would probably pay it back on June 30, 2013, and immediately borrow it back again on July 1st.
