Mayor Lavagnino announced that, among other achievements, Chief Jones led the effort to acquire two pieces of steel from World Trade Center to be placed in front of the two new fire stations, and thanked him.

Fire Chief Jeff Jones spoke about his eight years of service with the City and the department. He has 33 years in the fire service, and is honored to finish his career in this City. NEW FIRE CHIEF INTRODUCTION AND SWEARING IN

City Manager Ness introduced incoming Fire Chief Dan Orr. Acting Chief Deputy City Clerk Garietz administered the Oath of Office and presented him with a Certificate of Appointment. Fire Chief Orr's wife, Melinda, pinned on his badge.

Fire Chief Orr thanked his family for their love and support. He thanked City Manager Ness and Assistant City Manager Haydon for their faith and support. It was time to pass a new revenue stream which will assist the community. He looks forward to working with the City Council and with City Management on this essential ballot measure. Mayor Lavagnino commented that had he wrote the resolution it would have said "City Manager Ness was the right man, at the right time, in the right place; and he is the best City Manager in the State of California bar any city of any size." City Manager Ness was also presented with a key to the City by Mayor Lavagnino.

City Manager Ness commented that he was honored and privileged to have worked for the City of Santa Maria for 22 years. He is one of three City Managers in 51 years. The City's staff are the most skilled, productive, results-oriented, and effective group of workers he had ever seen. Without their assistance and help, he would have never been able to do his job as effectively. He individually thanked the Mayor and City Council for their support over the years. He also thanked Bob Hatch and the Chamber of Commerce. The City had developed a positive, working professional relationship with the Chamber which was critical. He thanked his family for their support and understanding of the long hours for such a demanding job. He will miss everyone dearly, but he knows that he is leaving the most effective and accomplished person, Rick Haydon, as the next City Manager.

Bob Hatch wished everyone Merry Christmas and congratulated Fire Chiefs Jones and Orr. He commented that City Manager Ness did what was best for the City at all times. They collaborated on many projects and always came to an agreement in the end. The City has moved forward through the toughest of times because of City Manager Ness. The City's success is due to his leadership, and he is grateful for knowing him.

At 7:12 p.m., Mayor Lavagnino called for a short recess. Mayor Lavagnino reconvened at 7:20 p.m.

PUBLIC COMMENT

Tom Radzysinski spoke on behalf of the Santa Maria Police Officers Association expressing concern over the call for bids for the retrofit of the proposed police facility. The City has over \$1 million set aside for a convention center, and he was not sure how much had been set aside for the retrofit. If the Council has the ability to set aside the funds for these purposes, then they should look at redirecting the funds for more important and immediate needs. With major staffing issues, the detective bureau is over worked with the increase in violent crimes. This is forcing patrol officers to take on the additional burdens. Most members are unable to receive in-service training due to lack of funds and have been told it was available for mission critical training only. He thinks due to recent incidents, redefining what constitutes mission critical is necessary.

CONSENT CALENDAR

Mayor Lavagnino requested Item 3E and 3J be pulled for comment. Councilmember Boysen requested Item 3F be pulled for comment. Councilmembers Cordero and Patino also requested 3J be pulled for comment.

Item 3E – Cancelling January 3, 2012, meeting

Mayor Lavagnino indicated that he wanted the public to be aware the next City Council meeting was cancelled.

Item 3F – Voluntary Time Off (VTO) program

Councilmember Boysen commented that the City does have the alternative to dip into specific excess reserves. He is not recommending that, but thinks it should be noted.

Item 3J – Call for Bids

Mayor Lavagnino commented that this item was simply giving approval to call for bids. At any time, the City could reject them if the Council chose. It was very short-sided to use one-time funds for ongoing expenses.

Councilmember Cordero agreed with Mayor Lavagnino regarding the use of one-time funds being used for ongoing expenses. He was interested in the costs associated with the project, but felt the project may have to be put on the back burner because of other priorities. He wants another opportunity to review the matter to be sure the Council would be doing the right thing.

Councilmember Patino commented that the City Council approved the purchase of the building and set up a financial plan years ago. No general funds were being spent, and the funds were coming from the rental income. The current police building is inadequate. The communications system is old and if it stops working, the City has a real safety issue. Public safety is number one, and the building is part of that. The Council should move forward.

City Manager Ness stated that in putting together the master plan for the police facility, research and design were done to determine the cost to buy land and build a new police station. When the plan was put together 15 years ago, the cost was prohibitive. The City found the Betteravia building several years later. The City of Santa Barbara was looking at conceptual plans to build a new 40,000 square foot police facility that will cost \$48 million. The Betteravia building was purchased for \$13 million. When the financial plan was put together it called for \$6 million in retrofit and tenant improvements. The total cost was approximately \$19 million. They are expecting the bids for this project to come in \$1.5 to \$1.8 million, all of which are being paid for by rental income. He cautioned the Council on spending one time monies for ongoing costs. That is why the quarter cent sales tax measure was so important. He hoped the Council would endorse it and place it on the ballot in June 2012. It would provide the funding needed to re-fund and rehire the police officers that have been lost in the budget process.

CONTINUED PUBLIC HEARING FOR SECOND READING OF A ZONING TEXT AMENDMENT ADDING CHAPTER 51 OF TITLE 12 OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE, Z-2011-003, E-2011-037, TO ESTABLISH A PROCEDURE FOR CONSIDERATION AND PROCESSING OF REQUESTS FOR DEVELOPMENT AGREEMENTS AND AUTHORIZING A FEE FOR THE PROCESSING OF DEVELOPMENT AGREEMENTS.

Community Development Director Appel gave the staff report. The City Council is asked to approve the second reading of an ordinance adding Chapter 51 of Title 12 of the Santa Maria Municipal Code to establish a procedure for considering and processing requests for Development Agreements, and establish a new fee based on time and material for processing the Development Agreement application. On December 6, 2011, the City Council approved the first reading of a zoning text amendment adding Chapter 51 to Title 12, Development Agreements. At that meeting, staff discussed a fee resolution to cover the time for City staff to process Development

Agreement applications. The fee resolution was prepared to reflect the discussion at the Council meeting of December 6, 2011. It includes the process for an applicant to submit a deposit at the time of application submittal, requires the account to remain current prior to noticing for the two public hearings, and that a final accounting assures all bills have been paid or refunds made, and that no funds remain in the account. A processing fee deposit in the amount of \$3,000 was proposed which was one-half the minimum cost to process a development agreement. Staff would draw down the deposit using the outside billing rates for the work done on the development agreement by the various departments. Should the deposit be exhausted, an additional deposit would be collected to complete the processing. A provision was also added to provide an option for the City Council to consider a future partial to full refund or rebate of the applicant's processing fees depending on the project's future ability to develop a significant number of long-term local jobs or offer significant benefits to the Community. If the City Council believes that the applicant can provide these benefits, the Development Agreement would incorporate performance standards to determine if the goals have been met.

Mayor Lavagnino opened the continued public hearing. Hearing no requests to speak, Mayor Lavagnino closed the public hearing.

Councilmember Patino asked if the applicant would be a part of the performance standards process, and confirmed that the conceptual review process did not cost the applicant anything. She thought workshops to better educate the developers would be helpful.

Director of Community Development Appel responded that the City wanted to make sure the process was understood by both parties. The development agreement would explain what benefits the applicant would receive, as well as the rebate process. In 2012, the department intends to start a series of workshops that would help the departments and the applicants better understand what was necessary to complete a project.

Councilmember Patino asked about the financing mechanism for public improvements, and what it entailed.

Director of Community Development Appel responded that it was a standard requirement of development agreements if there were infrastructure improvements.

The second reading by title only was conducted for Ordinance No. 2011-11 to add Chapter 51 to Title 12 of the Municipal Code to establishing a procedure for processing of development agreements. On motion by Councilmember Cordero, seconded by Councilmember Orach, and carried on the following vote:

AMENDMENT TO AND AN EXTENSION OF THE CURRENT MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING (MOU) WITH THE SERVICE EMPLOYEES INTERNATIONAL UNION (SEIU); WAGE AND BENEFIT PACKAGES FOR THE NON-REPRESENTED MANAGEMENT & CONFIDENTIAL EMPLOYEES AND THE PUBLIC SAFETY MANAGERS; AND EXTENDING SALARY CONCESSIONS FOR PLANNING COMMISSIONERS, RECREATION & PARKS COMMISSIONERS, AND ELECTED OFFICIALS FOR THE 2012 CALENDAR YEAR.

Assistant City Manager Haydon gave the staff report. Over the last three years, the National, State and local economies have been impacted by one of the most significant recessions this Country has experienced. A recession that resulted in a housing market collapse, high unemployment rates, lower than normal consumer confidence and an unprecedented increase in retail and commercial vacancies. As the City's major revenue sources in the General Fund are economy driven, when the economy is down, so are City revenues. The City entered 2011-12 with a multi-million dollar budget deficit and balanced it with a combination of one-time financing, elimination of full-time and part-time positions, and anticipated concessions from all employee groups. City staff has met with each of the represented bargaining groups to garner economic concessions for calendar year 2012. All employee groups were informed that the City was in a concession bargaining position and was seeking a continuation of existing concessions. Negotiations with SEIU, the non-represented managers and confidential employees, and public safety managers have concluded. Each of the negotiated packages call for a continuation of the existing compensation concessions for 2012. With the exception of full-time solid waste personnel, SEIU agreed to five percent compensation concessions and continue the Mandatory Time Off (MTO) Program totaling 13 days. Full-time solid waste personnel agreed to a four percent compensation concession. City offices will be closed for the MTO days on the third Friday of every month except in the month of December. During the month of December, City offices will be closed the second Friday along with December 24th, Christmas Eve. The landfill will recognize thirteen different days and will be closed to the public on January 8, February 19, March 18, April 22, May 13, June 17, July 22, August 19, September 23,

October 21, November 18, and December 23. Non-represented Management and Confidential Employees and Public Safety Managers have agreed to wage and benefit packages of the five percent salary concessions to continue into 2012. Modifications also included contribution adjustments to health insurance, cash out provisions, and clean up language in the appropriate respective resolutions. Ordinance 2008-02 provides for the City Council to receive a monthly salary. In 2011, the City Council voluntarily took a five percent reduction to their salaries. Staff proposed the opportunity to continue the voluntary reduction for 2012. Similar action was taken regarding the stipends of Planning Commissioners' and Recreation and Parks Commissioners' compensation in the prior year. Staff proposed continuation of the five percent reduction for 2012. The fiscal impact of the compensation concessions through June 20, 2012, is anticipated to be approximately \$505,000, with an annual savings of slightly more than one million dollars during the 2012 calendar year. The General Fund savings is anticipated to be approximately \$296,250. Staff is currently in discussions with the Santa Maria Police Officers Association and hoping to bring to Council a contract extension agreement in 2012.

Mayor Lavagnino commented that there will be no layoffs. The employees have made a tremendous sacrifice for the City. When the time came, he hoped that members on the City Council would make amends.

Assistant City Manager Haydon indicated that it was not an easy task sitting across the table from employees asking for a continuation of existing concessions. It was the third year in a row that employees had come forward and agreed to concessions. Other neighboring cities had not garnered concessions from their employees. They had only staved off cost-of-living increases. The City was been able to go one step further with a two-tiered retirement system and garnered a continuation of concessions.

Councilmember Orach commented that SEIU was the first to step up in the mid 1990's and initiate the MTOs.

Daniel Vegezzi, President of SEIU Local 620, commented that it represented 300 employees. SEIU was the first and only bargaining unit to agree to furloughs and layoffs in 1993-94. They were being asked to step up for a third year in a row now. They continue to keep the City up and running providing stellar service to the residents of the City. It was not in the City's best interest to continue using its employees as a revenue source, and it could no longer be an option in the future. They had nothing more to give. The City needs to look for a new revenue source. Members of Local 620 stand behind the quarter cent sales tax measure. They were also residents of the City, and understood the need to share in the cost of keeping the City afloat during the tough economic times. He thanked Assistant City Manager Haydon and the bargaining team for negotiating an agreement in good faith within the parameters given. He also thanked City Manager Ness for working with Local 620 over the years, and wished him the best in his retirement.

Councilmember Patino thanked Mr. Vegezzi and the members of Local 620. The Council is often complimented about the City's employees.

CITY MANAGER'S REPORT

The meeting for January 3rd has been cancelled. City Manager Ness reported on items anticipated for the January 17, 2012, City Council meeting, including the adoption of a resolution calling for an election for a sales tax override ballot measure for the June 2012 election. It would be the last opportunity the Council would have to make a decision to place that item on the June ballot. It will take a 5-0 vote of the City Council. The ballot measure's number one priority is to support public safety and refund some of the unfunded positions in the police department, as well as to hire new firefighters to staff the new Fire Station No. 5. Also anticipated are the annual board appointments to the All-America City Committee, Landmark Committee, and the Santa Maria Community Television Board. He wished everyone a Merry Christmas and thanked the City Council.

Councilmember Orach has had the pleasure to work with each of the three City Managers. City Manager Ness has done so much for the City, including fundraising. He is proud to be his friend and hates to see him go.
